

IHEA Welcomes Victoria's International Education Recovery Plan

Independent Higher Education Australia (IHEA) welcomes the Victorian Government's \$52.9 million *Victoria's International Education Recovery Plan 2025* to help rebuild the international education sector and become a global leader in education for quality, innovation, and inclusion.

The plan demonstrates support for Victoria's higher education providers as destinations of choice for international students, and the positioning international education sector to respond to emerging opportunities through government partnerships, engagement and aligned advocacy.

The plan sets out five pillars supported by 19 actions:

- The student experience:
 - Study Melbourne Hub Victoria.
 - International student employment and accommodation legal service.
 - Study Melbourne inclusion program.
 - International student travel pass.
- Employability and student return on investment:
 - Study Melbourne empowered series.
 - Study Melbourne ambassadors.
 - Career pathways.
 - Alumni engagement.
- Promotion of Victoria's education offering:
 - Study Melbourne brand.
 - Showcase regional Victoria.
 - Celebrate achievement and excellence.
- Market access and global connections:
 - Expanded global education network.
 - Offshore Study Melbourne hubs.
 - Edtech and innovation.
- Partnerships and collaboration for a strong sector:
 - Industry engagement.
 - Student engagement.
 - Student experience network.
 - Collaboration with the City of Melbourne.
 - Commonwealth advocacy.

The independent higher education sector plays an important role in educating both international and domestic students. Victoria is home to the main campus of several IHEA members including University of Divinity, Academies Australasia Polytechnic, Australian College of the Arts (COLLARTS), Eastern College Australia, Marcus Oldham College, Photography Studies College, Lyons College, Navitas (Melbourne Institute of Business and Technology, Navitas Bundoora, SAE Institute), The MIECAT Institute, National Institute of Organisation Dynamics Australia, Institute of Health and Management, Holmes Institute, and LCI Melbourne.

Several other IHEA members also have a campus presence in Victoria.
